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1. VHHA in Action

Each day, VHHA actively works on behalf of its members, their employees, and Virginians to advance the interests of Virginia's hospitals and health care systems. In the past week, here are some developments of interest to Virginia hospitals and health systems:

- The Virginia Neonatal Perinatal Collaborative (VNPC) is offering two free webinar series focused on maternal and child health in 2024. One is centered on 2SLGBTQIA+ mental health and reproductive care. Webinars in that series are held every third Thursday of the month from 12-1 p.m. from January-May 2024. Register for that series here. The other is the VNPC 2024 monthly webinar series held the third Tuesday of each month from 12-1 p.m. Webinars in this series focus on relevant topics in maternal and infant health in Virginia. Register here.
- This month, VHHA hosted an installment of its quarterly public health webinar series for Virginia hospitals and health systems featuring updates provided by Virginia Department of Health (VDH) officials. Topics covered in this ongoing webinar series may include disease surveillance, modeling, influenza, RSV, and unique pathogens. Additional topics may vary depending on current events. Future webinars scheduled for March 6 and June 5 will be hosted on Microsoft Teams. - The Virginia Nurses Association (VNA) has 15 grant-supported nursing scholarship opportunities
 available for participants in the 2024 Virginia Nurse Leadership Academy. The program, which is
 presented by the Virginia Nurses Foundation with scholarship support from VDH, is accepting 35
 total fellows. This is the second year for the Academy, which has already graduated more than

- The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved belzutifan (Welireg, Merck & Co., Inc.) for patients with advanced renal cell carcinoma (RCC) following a programmed death receptor-1 (PD-1) or programmed death-ligand 1 (PD-L1) inhibitor and a vascular endothelial growth factor tyrosine kinase inhibitor (VEGF-TKI). - Registration is now open for the fourth annual Regional Human Trafficking Summit hosted by the Regional Interdisciplinary Collaborative Working to Disrupt Human Trafficking (RIC), a multi-state non-profit group that brings together academics, advocates, caregivers, clinicians, law enforcement, survivors, and other stakeholders who are working to end human trafficking. The theme of the Summit, which is scheduled for Feb. 7-8, 2024 at the VCU School of Medicine, is "Expanding Community Partnerships to Address Human Trafficking." - The FDA recently approved two treatments, Casgevy and Lyfgenia, as the first cell-based gene therapies for the treatment of sickle cell disease (SCD) in patients 12 and older. Casgevy is also the first FDA-approved treatment to utilize a type of novel genome editing technology, signaling innovative advancement in the field of gene therapy. Sickle cell disease is a group of inherited blood disorders affecting approximately 100,000 people in the U.S. It is most common in African Americans and, while less prevalent, also affects Hispanic Americans. The primary problem in sickle cell disease is a mutation in hemoglobin, a protein found in red blood cells that delivers oxygen to the body's tissues. This mutation causes red blood cells to develop a crescent or "sickle" shape. These sickled red blood cells restrict the flow in blood vessels and limit oxygen delivery to the body's tissues, leading to severe pain and organ damage called vaso-occlusive events (VOEs) or vaso-occlusive crises (VOCs). The recurrence of these events or crises can lead to life-threatening disabilities or early death. Read more here.
- The **U.S.** Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) recently issued a <u>concept paper</u> that outlines its cybersecurity strategy for the health care sector. The concept paper builds on the <u>National Cybersecurity Strategy</u> that **U.S.** President Joe Biden previously released, focusing specifically on strengthening resilience for hospitals, patients, and communities threatened by cyber-attacks. The paper details four pillars for action, including publishing new voluntary health care-specific cybersecurity performance goals, working with Congress to develop supports and incentives for domestic hospitals to improve cybersecurity, and increasing accountability and coordination within the health care sector. According to the **HHS Office for Civil Rights** (OCR), cyber incidents in health care are on the rise. From 2018-2022, there has been a 93 percent increase in large breaches reported to OCR (369 to 712), with a 278 percent increase in large breaches involving ransomware. Cyber incidents affecting hospitals and health systems have led to extended care disruptions, patient diversions to other facilities, and delayed medical procedures, all putting patient safety at risk. 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2. VHHA Launches 'Control Your Care' Campaign to Empower Patients in Making Health Care Decisions

State and federal policymakers, with support from the hospital community, have passed a series of laws protecting patients and families from surprise medical bills, promoting health insurance and hospital price transparency, and enabling people to get good faith price estimates prior to scheduled hospital procedures. Yet the vast majority of Virginians don't know these consumer-friendly reforms exist to benefit them, according to statewide polling and focus group research conducted this year by the Virginia Hospital & Healthcare Association (VHHA). To address that information gap, VHHA is launching the "Control Your Care" public awareness campaign to ensure patients and families know their rights to help them make informed medical decisions. The campaign includes a website, ControlYourCare.com, with easy-to-understand information about consumer-focused health care reforms, links to state and federal laws regarding good faith price estimates, insurance and health care price transparency, surprise medical bills as well as descriptions of what the laws do, and other tools to serve the public. This campaign will be supported with statewide digital and broadcast advertising to help raise public awareness about the availability of these resources. Read more here. – Julian Walker

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3. Governor Youngkin's Budget Proposal Includes Funding for Behavioral Health, Workforce

Virginia Governor Glenn Youngkin presented his vision for the Commonwealth's next two-year budget during a joint address to the General Assembly's money committees this week. Branded the "Unleashing Opportunity" budget proposal, this fiscal blueprint represents a singular opportunity for Governor Youngkin to imprint his priorities on how Virginia allocates its financial resources at the midway point of his gubernatorial term. This plan continues the Governor's pursuit of tax reform and tax relief for Virginians by calling for a sweeping 12 percent income tax reduction, which would lower rates across Virginia tax brackets if enacted. The proposed offset for this would be a nearly 1 percent increase in the state sales and use tax as well as broadened application of the tax to apply to certain digital products such as software and streaming services that presently are not subject to the tax. Governor Youngkin also called for an end to Virginia's car tax, which is levied by localities and collected as a local revenue source. Localities currently receive a \$950 million annual subsidy from the state as a form of consumer tax relief. The Governor indicated that an adjustment in local and state sales and use taxes could be a means to offset current car tax collections. On health care, the Governor's budget includes a series of proposals to make continued investments into behavioral health care and health care workforce development. Several of these concepts reflected budget requests from VHHA, including:

- \$10 million in state fiscal year (SFY) 2025 for Comprehensive Psychiatric Emergency Programs or similar models.
- \$35 million over the biennium to expand and modernize the comprehensive crisis services system – including crisis receiving centers, crisis stabilization units, and enhancements to existing sites.

The budget proposal also includes \$9.5 million over the biennium to expand alternative transportation providers, \$10 million in SFY 2025 for one-time costs to establish additional mobile crisis services in underserved areas, and \$400,000 in SFY 2025 to establish a one-year demonstration project to implement testing for analyzing fentanyl and norfentanyl in wastewater in up to three geographically diverse localities. In terms of health care workforce funding, several provisions in the proposed budget reflect VHHA requests, including:

- \$8 million over the biennium to continue the Earn to Learn Nursing Education Acceleration program.
- \$10 million over the biennium for Virginia's Behavioral Health Loan Repayment Program.
- \$1.8 million over the biennium for nursing scholarships, loan repayment, and incentive programs based on priorities identified by the Commissioner of Health and the ability of the department to expedite funding to recipients.

The Governor's budget proposal is the starting point for development of the biennial budget that covers a two-year period beginning July 1, 2024. Lawmakers in both chambers of the General Assembly will offer amendments to the budget during the scheduled 60-day legislative session that begins in January. Ultimately, the legislature will pass a compromise budget that reflects a modified version of Governor Youngkin's proposal. The Governor will then have the opportunity to consider the package of amendments sent to him with the option to individually accept them, further modify them through amendment, or reject them by veto. Legislators then get a final chance to consider any changes from the Governor when they return to Richmond for a one-day "reconvened" session in April. Throughout this process, the VHHA Government Affairs team will remain diligently engaged with the Youngkin Administration and members of the General Assembly to advocate for policy and budgetary outcomes that support Virginia hospitals and health systems in their mission of serving patients and enhancing public health. – Julie Dime

7. AHA to Host Rural Health Care Leadership Conference in February

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8. Federal Agencies Issue Final Rule on Administrative Fees for Surprise Billing Dispute Resolution

HHS and the **U.S. Departments of Labor** and **Treasury** have issued a <u>final rule</u> that increases the administrative fee for disputes initiated under the *No Surprises Act* independent dispute resolution (IDR) process from \$50 to \$115 per party per dispute. The departments also finalized an increase to the fee range for certified IDR entities to \$200-\$840 for single determinations and \$268-\$1,173 for batched determinations. IDR entities will have discretion to increase the fee for batched disputes with more than 25 line items at a rate of \$75-\$250 per increment of 25 line items. The changes take effect for disputes

initiated on or after 30 days after publication of the final rule in the Federal Register, which is anticipated to occur within the next week. These fees will remain in effect until changed by subsequent notice-and-comment rulemaking. The rule was developed following a federal court decision earlier this year that vacated a nationwide a federal fee increase and batching rule for the IDR process for certain out-of-network providers and group health plans on the grounds that they violated the Administrative Procedures Act's notice-and-comment requirement.
