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1. VHHA in Action

Each day, VHHA actively works on behalf of its members, their employees, and Virginians to advance the interests of Virginia's hospitals and health care systems. In the past week, here are some developments of interest to Virginia hospitals and health systems:

- VHHA held a meeting of the **Executive Committee** of the **Board of Directors** this week for a discussion of issues of importance to hospital and health system members.
- In accordance with Center for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) requirements, the Virginia Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS) is working with the provider community, managed care organizations (MCO), and the agency's provider services solutions (PRSS) vendor, Gainwell Technologies, to accomplish timely provider revalidations. All Medicaid providers, including MCO network providers, are required to revalidate provider enrollment in PRSS at least every five years. PRSS revalidation is when a provider submits a revalidation application for a Provider/National Provider Identifier (NPI) that has an existing enrollment record in PRSS prior to the end of their enrollment period without an enrollment gap. Providers should receive a DMAS notice to begin their revalidation applications at least 90 days before the end of their enrollment period. The notice is sent via e-mail or U.S. Mail depending on a provider's communications preferences recorded in PRSS. Reminder notices are also sent via e-mail from appshcproductNoReply@gainwelltechnologies.com at 60 and 30 days prior to the deadline. Providers must submit the revalidation electronically through the Provider Services Solution (PRSS) portal. DMAS has implemented a new Manage Revalidation panel within the PRSS portal. This panel displays a list in-process revalidation application tracking numbers (ATNs) for the base identification number and any locations for whom that provider may be an authorized administrator (AA) for a primary account holder. The new panel provides information required to access the revalidation application without having to match up numerous notification emails.

- It also provides a link directly into the resume/revalidate enrollment page to reset a password if needed. The Provider Portal User Guide PRSS-120 is located on the <u>MES Provider Training</u> <u>webpage</u> and has information on the new manage revalidation panel. - VHHA recently hosted an installment of its quarterly public health webinar series for hospitals and health systems featuring updates from the Virginia Department of Health (VDH). Topics covered in this webinar series may include disease surveillance, modeling, influenza, RSV, and unique pathogens, among others. Additional topics may vary depending on current events. - The Virginia Department of Health (VDH) has provided updated information about funding available to health care providers through the <u>Nurse Preceptor Incentive Program</u>. Hospital team members who serve as preceptors may be eligible to apply for available funding in addition to any incremental salary/rate that may be provided to those serving as a preceptor. Expansion of the program was a key workforce legislative agenda item for 2024, resulting in increased funding available in the state fiscal year 2024 budget as well as updated language allowing preceptors for RNs to be eligible for the programs. - VHHA, VNPC, and other partner organizations are hosting a free, five-part monthly webinar series focused on public-facing maternal and infant health data sources that organizations can use for research, quality improvement, grant applications, and more. The webinar series has been designed for hospital and community partners and will feature presentations from representatives of VHHA, VNPC, the Virginia Department of Health (VDH), the Virginia Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS), and Virginia Health Information (VHI). - The Virginia Infection Prevention Training Center (VIPTC) has released a new round of infection prevention and control training videos that use animation to convey information about infection prevention and control topics that are important for health care professionals to know. - "The Future of Medicine Now" is the title of an upcoming half-day symposium for health care professionals scheduled to be held March 23 at the Westin Hotel Richmond. The conference

will focus on the latest in leading-edge technology and research in cardiology and vascular medicine. Topics include treatment for arrhythmia, heart failure, valvular disease, vascular disease, and current research at **HCA Virginia**. The target audience includes physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurses, technologists, pharmacists, and emergency medical service providers. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently issued updated recommendations for individuals to protect against respiratory viruses including COVID-19. The new guidance indicates individuals who test positive no longer need to isolate for five days. CDC indicates the guidance brings a unified approach to addressing risks from a range of common respiratory viral illnesses, such as COVID-19, flu, and RSV, which can cause significant health impacts and strain on hospitals and health care workers. CDC is updating the recommendations as the U.S. is experiencing fewer hospitalizations and deaths associated with COVID-19. When people get sick with a respiratory virus, the updated guidance recommends that they stay home and away from others. For people with COVID-19 and influenza, treatment is available and can lessen symptoms and lower the risk of severe illness. The recommendations suggest returning to normal activities when, for at least 24 hours, symptoms are improving overall, and if a fever was present, it has been gone without use of a fever-reducing medication. Once people resume normal activities, they are encouraged to employ additional prevention strategies for the next five days to curb disease spread, such as taking more steps for cleaner air, enhancing hygiene practices, wearing a well-fitting mask, keeping a distance from others, and/or getting tested for respiratory viruses. 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2. State Budget Summary and Potential Next Steps in the Legislative Process

Virginia has a budget. The degree to which the version of the two-year state spending plan recently approved by the **Virginia General Assembly** is changed by **Virginia Governor Glenn Youngkin** remains to be seen. The budget legislation approved by lawmakers earlier this month is a plan that sets out state expenditures and programmatic priorities for a two-year period beginning July 1, 2024. It includes several items of interest to the hospital community. Not included in the budget are provisions to support the creation of a proposed professional sports arena complex in Alexandria, VA. Establishing the complex as a new home for Washington, D.C.-based professional basketball and hockey teams is a priority for Governor Youngkin. The current expectation is that the Governor, who has 30 days to review and modify the budget through amendments and line-item vetoes, will make significant changes to the budget, including modifications to advance the arena project. The General Assembly is scheduled to return to Richmond on April 17 for a one-day reconvened session to consider legislative amendments sent down by the Governor. If an accord isn't reached on budget amendments that day, the potential exists for the Governor to call the General Assembly back for a legislative special session primarily focused on crafting a new state budget. The current version of the budget incorporates several health care-related provisions such as:

- The reallocation of \$10 million in state fiscal year (SFY) 2025 funding from Comprehensive Psychiatric Emergency Programs and similar models to other behavioral health initiatives, such as STEP-VA, discharge planning, and housing supports.
- In behavioral health, \$25 million over two years to expand and modernize the comprehensive crisis services system.

- \$9.4 million over the biennium to expand alternative transportation and custody programs to individuals under a temporary detention order (TDO).
- \$10 million in SFY 25 for one-time costs to establish additional mobile crisis services in underserved areas as a continuation of funding that was approved in Sept. 2023.
- \$30.5 million over the biennium to combat the opioid epidemic in the Commonwealth.
- On health care workforce development, the budget includes \$8 million over the biennium to
 continue the Earn to Learn Nursing Education Acceleration program, as well as \$14.7 million
 over the biennium for Virginia's Behavioral Health Loan Repayment Program. This helps expand
 the program to add child and adolescent psychiatry fellows to the list of Tier 1 providers eligible
 for the program, add Tier III providers who are mental health professionals who do not already
 qualify for the program, and to add academic medical centers as a preferred practice site.
- \$1 million over the biennium to add 10 graduate medical education (GME) residency slots for OB/GYN services.
- \$7 million over the biennium for the Nursing Preceptor Incentive Program.
- \$3.8 million over the biennium for nursing scholarships, loan repayment, and incentive programs to recruit and retain nurses and nurse faculty.
- To address projected growth in Medicaid enrollment and costs, the budget sets aside \$150 million in reserves in the event of unexpected increases in Medicaid expenditures.
- The budget includes \$4.8 million over the biennium to increase reimbursement rates for durable medical equipment.
- Language in the budget directs the Virginia Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS) to convene a workgroup to evaluate current disproportionate share hospital (DSH) criteria for hospitals to qualify for a disproportionate share of hospital payments. The workgroup will recommend a new Medicaid inpatient utilization threshold and report its findings to the Governor and the Chairs of the House Appropriations Committee and the Senate Finance and Appropriations Committee.

As budget deliberations occur, the **VHHA Government Relations Team** will continue its vigorous engagement with legislators and the Youngkin Administration to advocate for budgetary action that supports Virginia hospitals, health systems, and community health in the Commonwealth. This activity will occur between now and the reconvened session in April and continue beyond that in the event of a special session being called. – Julie Dime

5. HHS, CMS Announces Flexibilities to Assist Provides Amid Change Healthcare Cyberattack Fallout

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) are alerting health care providers about options that can support them in maintaining cash flow and serving patients amid the ongoing impact of the cyberattack on Change Healthcare (a division of UnitedHealth Group) that began Feb. 21. Many health care providers and facilities have voiced concerns stemming from an inability to submit claims and receive payments for care rendered due to the inaccessibility of Change systems. The flexibilities recently announced by HHS and CMS are related to Medicare, Medicaid, and CHIP, Medicare Advantage organizations, and Medicare Administrative Contractors. CMS has made available Change Healthcare/Optum Payment Disruption (CHOPD) accelerated payments to Part A providers and advance payments to Part B suppliers experiencing claims disruptions as a result of the incident. The CHOPD accelerated and advance payments may be granted in amounts representative of up to thirty (30) days of claims payments to eligible providers and suppliers. Read more here. Wegovy should be used in addition to a reduced calorie diet and increased physical activity. Cardiovascular disease is a group of diseases of the heart and blood vessels. Read more here.
