#### 1. VHHA in Action

Each day, VHHA actively works on behalf of its members, their employees, and Virginians to advance the interests of Virginia's hospitals and health care systems. In the past week, here are some developments of interest to Virginia hospitals and health systems:

- VHHA held a weekly legislative briefing call for its Board of Directors and convened a meeting of the Virginia Hospital & Healthcare Advocacy Committee (VHHAC) for discussions about pending legislation, policy, and budgetary issues before the Virginia General Assembly.
- This week, VHHA hosted an installment of its quarterly public health webinar series for hospitals and health systems featuring updates from the Virginia Department of Health (VDH). Topics covered in this webinar series may include disease surveillance, modeling, influenza, RSV, and unique pathogens, among others. Additional topics may vary depending on current events. - VHHA Solutions and its endorsed partner, ChartSpan, are presenting a webinar on Wednesday, March 27 at noon on the topic of "Mastering Chronic Care Management in a Changing Landscape." More than two-thirds (68 percent) of Medicare beneficiaries have two or more chronic conditions, which can lead to greater risk of hospitalization and negative health outcomes. Chronic Care Management, a Medicare program that focuses on patients with multiple chronic conditions, may be able to help break through these barriers and empower patients to actively manage their health, improve their quality of life, and ultimately reduce their health care costs. The upcoming webinar will explore the practical intricacies of CCM, address reimbursement changes for 2024, and some challenges with establishing a CCM program. Webinar attendees will have the opportunity to ask questions about setting up CCM

- programs as well as the benefits and challenges of running a program independently or with a CCM provider. The webinar will demonstrate why many health care practices use CCM to provide patients with coordinated care and empower them to take control of their health. - Leaders in the **U.S. Congress** recently released the <u>text of appropriations legislation</u> they intend to advance this week. The funding package contains several provisions to address key health care extenders and other priorities, including: delays in Medicaid payments cuts to disproportionate share hospitals (DSH) and extensions for community health centers, national health service corps, and teaching health centers that operate graduate medical education (GME) programs; temporary payment increase under the Medicare Physician Fee Schedule and an extension of increased inpatient hospital payment adjustment for certain hospitals; and behavioral health provisions such as requiring state Medicaid plans to cover medication-assisted treatment, creating a permanent state Medicaid option allowing substance user disorder treatment at institutions, monitoring the prescribing of anti-psychotic medications, and providing guidance related to improving the behavioral health workforce. The legislation does not contain site-neutral, price transparency, or 340B provisions of the Lower Costs More Transparency Act, nor does it reauthorize the SUPPORT Act or the Pandemic and All-Hazards Preparedness Act. VHHA remains engaged in communication with congressional leaders regarding funding priorities for hospitals and health systems.
- The Virginia Neonatal Perinatal Collaborative (VNPC) is hosting the 2024 Day of Learning event March 17-18 at The Westin Richmond. The theme for this year's event is "Connecting the Dots: Data to Action" and programming will focus on the connection between two pillars of maternal and infant health improvement work: data and evidence-based action. A wide array of experts will speak on topics relevant to maternal and infant health in Virginia, emphasizing how data broadens our understanding of the problems we are facing, the progress we have made, and how to best move forward. - The Virginia Infection Prevention Training Center (VIPTC) has released a new round of infection
  prevention and control training videos that use animation to convey information about infection
  prevention and control topics that are important for health care professionals to know. The

- The **U.S. Food and Drug Administration** (FDA) has granted emergency use authorization (EUA) for the first over-the-counter home antigen test to detect flu and COVID-19. The SEKISUI Diagnostics LLC OSOM Flu SARS-CoV-2 Combo Home Test is authorized for use to detect and differentiate influenza A and B and SARS-CoV-2 in nasal swab specimens from people aged 14 and older when conducted at least twice over three days with at least 48 hours between tests. The test is authorized for people ages 14 or older with self-collected anterior (nares) nasal swab specimens and those aged two years or older when an adult collects the nasal swab specimens. The OSOM Flu SARS-CoV-2 Combo Home Test is the first over the counter at-home antigen test that detects both flu and COVID-19 viruses to receive an EUA.
- The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services
   (HHS) are soliciting public comment under a request for information pertaining to market
   concentration among large health care group purchasing organizations (GPO) and drug
   wholesalers, as well as information about contracting practices. The purpose of the request is to
   provide the federal agencies with an understanding of how the practices of two pharmaceutical
   drug middlemen groups GPOs and drug wholesalers may contribute to generic drug
   shortages. Comments may be submitted through this link.

"The Future of Medicine Now" is the title of an upcoming half-day symposium for health care professionals scheduled to be held March 23 at the Westin Hotel – Richmond. The conference will focus on the latest in leading-edge technology and research in cardiology and vascular medicine. Topics include treatment for arrhythmia, heart failure, valvular disease, vascular disease, and current research at HCA Virginia. The target audience includes physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurses, technologists, pharmacists, and emergency medical service providers. # 2. Virginia General Assembly Leaders Announce Budget Deal, Signaling End of 2024 Legislation Session

With just days to spare, a pair of Virginia General Assembly leaders this week announced that a state budget deal has been brokered, putting lawmakers on pace to complete their work and conclude the 2024 regular legislative session by the previously scheduled target adjournment date of Saturday, March 9. It is the first time in several years that work on the state budget has been completed on time. The announcement of a budget deal came in the form of a joint statement issued Thursday (March 7) by Senator Louise Lucas of Portsmouth, Chair of the Senate Finance and Appropriations Committee, and Delegate Luke Torian of Prince William County, Chair of the House Appropriations Committee. The brief statement doesn't provide many specific details. It references funding for "education, health and human resources, public safety, and in protecting Virginia's environment" and mentions pay raises for teachers and state and local government employees, as well as "additional investments in health and human resources to address behavioral health and in public safety to make communities safer through funding for violence prevention and supports for victims of crime." Amendments to the compromise budget bill can be viewed online here. VHHA will provide additional details about health-related budget provisions after they become available. The budget pending approval by the legislature reflects an amended version of the fiscal blueprint proposed by Virginia Governor Glenn Youngkin in December 2023 to govern state spending during a two-year period beginning July 1, 2024. Once approved by the legislature, the budget will be sent to Governor Youngkin for his review, at which point he has the ability to amend elements of the budget bill. He can also reject budget provisions with a line-item veto. The budget does not include a package of financial support for a proposed professional sports arena complex in Alexandria, a key priority for the Governor. That omission is a complicating factor which portends uncertainty about how the Governor may deal with the budget legislation that is sent to him. Legislators are scheduled to return to Richmond in April to consider and act upon any changes the Governor makes to the budget. Throughout this process, the VHHA Government Relations Team will continue its vigorous engagement with the Youngkin Administration to advocate for budgetary action that supports Virginia hospitals, health systems, and community health in the Commonwealth. – Julie Dime

7. VDH Provides Details on Nurse Preceptor Incentive Program Funding

The **Virginia Department of Health** (VDH) has provided updated information about funding available to health care providers through the <u>Nurse Preceptor Incentive Program</u>. Hospital team members who serve as preceptors may be eligible to apply for available funding in addition to any incremental salary/rate that may be provided to those serving as a preceptor. Expansion of the program was a key workforce legislative agenda item for 2024, resulting in increased funding available in the state fiscal year 2024 budget as well as updated language allowing preceptors for RNs to be eligible for the programs. ## 9. CDC Updates Guidance Regarding Respiratory Virus Safety, Relaxes Isolation Recommendations

The **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention** (CDC) recently issued updated recommendations for individuals to protect against respiratory viruses including COVID-19. The new guidance indicates individuals who test positive no longer need to isolate for five days. CDC indicates the guidance brings a unified approach to addressing risks from a range of common respiratory viral illnesses, such as COVID-19, flu, and RSV, which can cause significant health impacts and strain on hospitals and health care workers. CDC is updating the recommendations as the U.S. is experiencing fewer hospitalizations and deaths associated with COVID-19. When people get sick with a respiratory virus, the updated guidance recommends that they stay home and away from others. For people with COVID-19 and influenza, treatment is available and can lessen symptoms and lower the risk of severe illness. The recommendations suggest returning to normal activities when, for at least 24 hours, symptoms are improving overall, and if a fever was present, it has been gone without use of a fever-reducing medication. Once people resume normal activities, they are encouraged to employ additional prevention strategies for the next five days to curb disease spread, such as taking more steps for cleaner air, enhancing hygiene practices, wearing a well-fitting mask, keeping a distance from others, and/or getting tested for respiratory viruses.
