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1. VHHA in Action

Each day, VHHA actively works on behalf of its members, their employees, and Virginians to advance the interests of Virginia's hospitals and health care systems. In the past week, here are some developments of interest to Virginia hospitals and health systems:

- This week, VHHA participated in the Real Life "Beyond Gunshots: Pathways to Safer Communities" conference by moderating a panel discussion featuring representatives from six Hospital-based Violence Intervention Programs (HVIPs), which provide support services to patients impacted by community and interpersonal violence. These interventions help restore lives and improve communities. Representatives from Children's Hospital of The King's Daughters, Sentara Health, VCU Health, Riverside, Bon Secours, and Carilion Clinic participated on the panel. View event photos here.
- VHHA staff attended the <u>quarterly meeting</u> of the Virginia State Board of Health this week.
 The meeting agenda included a regulatory action update, a presentation on the Sickle Cell Program, amendments to regulations for the Virginia Immunization Information System, and more.
- This week, VHHA staff attended a meeting of the State Emergency Medical Services
 Advisory Board, where the <u>agenda</u> focused on internal and external audit findings related to an investigation into the misappropriation of state funds.
- The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has issued <u>draft guidance</u> on "Integrating Randomized Controlled Trials for Drug and Biological Products into Routine Clinical Practice" to support the conduct of randomized controlled trials with streamlined protocols and procedures that focus on essential data collection, allowing integration of research into routine clinical practice. Public comments on the draft guidance are being accepted.

- The U.S Department of Labor, Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), and the Treasury Department recently issued a final rule to promote commercial health plan compliance with the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act of 2008 that requires mental health and substance use disorder benefits at the same level as medical and surgical benefits. Provisions in the final rule set standards for determining network composition and out-of-network reimbursement rates; adds protections against restrictive non-quantitative treatment limitations (NQTL) in coverage; and prohibits plans from using non-objective information that may negatively impact access to mental health or substance use disorder care when applying NQTL.
- The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) recently issued revised guidance on participation conditions and the conversion process for facilities to participate in Medicare and Medicaid as a rural emergency hospital, a provider designation established in federal law in 2020 in response to rural hospital closures and to promote health care access in rural communities. When eligible facilities convert to a rural emergency hospital they are permitted to provide emergency department services, observation care, and other services as elected provided the average annual patient length of stay is less than 24 hours. Medicare pays rural emergency hospitals an extra 5 percent above the hospital outpatient prospective payment system rate to provide emergency, observation, and other outpatient services to Medicare patients. - VHHA recently hosted a webinar in the quarterly public health webinar series for Virginia hospitals and health systems. The webinar series is hosted by VHHA in collaboration with Virginia Department of Health (VDH) officials who provide updates on key topics including disease surveillance, modeling, influenza, RSV, and unique pathogens, among others. - The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) is accepting <u>public comments</u> through Nov. 12 pertaining to a proposed plan for data collection and audit requirements for Medicaid Advantage plans related to compliance with the calendar year 2024 Medicare Advantage final rule.
- HosPAC, the political action committee of VHHA, is in the midst of its 2024 fundraising campaign and needs support from members of the health care community. 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7. FDA Accepting Public Comments on Draft Guidance for Oncology Clinical Development Programs

The **U.S. Food and Drug Administration** (FDA) is accepting public comments through Nov. 18 on <u>draft guidance</u> pertaining to "Considerations for Generating Clinical Evidence From Oncology Multiregional Clinical Development Programs." The draft guidance provides recommendations to sponsors who are planning global clinical development programs for drugs intended to treat cancer, on improving the evidence obtained from one or more multiregional clinical trials (MRCTs) intended to support a marketing application. This draft guidance expands on principles described in the FDA's existing guidance documents related to this topic, by providing additional recommendations for the planning, design, conduct, and analysis of an oncology MRCT that may facilitate the FDA's assessment of applicability of the data to the U.S. population with the cancer being investigated and to U.S. medical practice.

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8. VNPC Recruiting Hospitals for Perinatal Mental Health Quality Improvement Project

The <u>Virginia Neonatal Perinatal Collaborative</u> (VNPC) is recruiting hospitals for its perinatal mental health quality improvement project, SMILE, which is fully aligned with the associated <u>AIM patient safety bundle</u>. For hospitals that need support to achieve the CMS "birthing friendly" designation, engagement in this project would satisfy the perinatal quality collaborative participation requirement. 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9. CMS Issues Request for Information on Artificial Intelligence Use by Health Care Providers

The **Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services** (CMS) recently issued a <u>request for information</u> seeking insight on artificial intelligence use by health care providers and other organizations that can improve health care outcomes and care delivery. Selected organizations will have the opportunity to give brief presentations on their AI products and services beginning in October. Those presentations will inform future CMS actions on AI.
