Virginia General Assembly Acts on COPN, Malpractice Legislation Ahead of Budget Sunday, Crossover

There is now more clarity on the fate of several bills of interest to hospitals and health systems • in the lead up to this weekend when the Virginia General Assembly will host budget Sunday, which is the day when the legislative money committees unveil their proposed amendments to the current two-year state budget. An amended version of House Bill 2219 is advancing. It directs the State Health Services Plan Task Force to develop recommendations for expedited certificate of public need (COPN) application review for projects in low population rural areas that meet certain conditions including lack of health care facility access. Another proposal, House Bill 2698, to create a COPN exception for hospitals that solely provide maternity care has been tabled. Legislation (Senate Bill 904) to lift the medical malpractice cap in situations involving patients 10 and younger failed to advance out of a Senate committee this week. And bills (House Bill 2099 and Senate Bill 1215) to reform health insurance prior authorization practices has passed the House of Delegates. This coming Tuesday, Feb. 4, is crossover day, which is the deadline for bills to clear their chamber of origin, House of Delegates or Virginia Senate, in order to remain active for consideration by the legislature. And Feb. 12 is the deadline for each chamber to complete work on budget and revenue bills and appoint conferees to negotiate final compromise plans. After the legislature adjourns (adjournment is scheduled for Feb. 22), the Governor reviews bills sent to his desk and has the option to let them become law, offer amendments, or issue vetoes. The General Assembly returns to Richmond on April 2 for the reconvened session to consider amendments and vetoes from the Governor. Throughout this time, the VHHA Government Affairs Team will be at the State Capitol in Richmond advocating for policies that support hospitals, health systems, and public health. Report Shows Virginia Hospital Spending Below National Average, Health Insurance Costs Rise Sharply

 Virginia families and individuals have endured double-digit percentage increases in health insurance premium costs in recent years, according to a new statewide analysis of health care spending trends conducted by **Onpoint Health Data**, a non-partisan analytics firm. The analysis shows that from 2019-2023, annual private health insurance premiums in Virginia increased 20.2 percent for single individuals and 22.1 percent for families. During the same period, total personal health care (PHC) spending (which includes hospital and professional care) increased by just 1.2 percent. The study further notes that since 2008 single premiums are up 94 percent. and family premiums have risen 103 percent. When annual out-of-pocket deductible costs are added to premium costs, total insurance costs have gone up 103 percent and 110 percent, respectively. The Onpoint Health Data analysis shows that the average single health insurance premium in 2023 was \$8,144 and the average family health insurance premium was \$24,251 for people with private sector employer-sponsored health care coverage. Findings in the study are based on data from the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA), the U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), and the Virginia All-Payer Claims Database (APCD). The report evaluates total health care spending, spending by category and payer, insurance premiums, and workforce trends. Read more here.

VHHA Hosts Member Briefing Calls on Blue Cross, Blue Shield Settlement

• This week, VHHA hosted a pair of briefing calls for hospital members regarding the Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS) provider antitrust litigation settlement. If approved by the court, the settlement will establish a \$2.8 billion settlement fund. Settling defendants, which include all Blue Cross Blue Shield plans nationwide, will also agree to make changes in the way they do business that will address the challenged practices and increase the opportunities for competition in the marketplace. All hospitals that served BCBS members during the settlement period are considered part of the class unless they opt-out by March 4, 2025. VHHA Hosts Webinar on Recruiting, Hiring, Training Peer Recovery Specialists

This week, VHHA and the VHHA Foundation hosted a webinar for health systems about the ways in which peer recovery specialists – people with lived experience who are not clinical staff – can help with efforts to improve population health, bridge to outpatient treatment options, link to community services, and help with education and awareness efforts. The webinar featured representatives from the Virginia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS) and Inova who provided insight about the value peer recovery specialists provide. The webinar was presented in conjunction with a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA)-funded project: the Hospital-based Substance Use Intervention Program (HSUIP) that involves hiring, training, certifying, and registering peer recovery specialists to assist emergency department bridge programs in Virginia. As part of this process, HSUIP aims to help health systems understand the process of hiring peers and billing for services to keep the programs sustainable.

Trump Administration Issues, then Rescinds Memo Halting Many Federal Grant Programs

This week, the **Administration of U.S. President Donald Trump** issued a <u>memo</u> directing federal agencies to "temporarily pause all activities related to obligation or disbursement of all Federal financial assistance, and other relevant agency activities that may be implicated by the executive orders,

including, but not limited to, financial assistance for foreign aid, nongovernmental organizations, DEI, woke gender ideology, and the green new deal" before <u>reportedly</u> withdrawing from the position days later. The White House subsequently <u>indicated</u> the freeze remained in place despite the memo being rescinded. Initially, the Administration issued the memo calling for the freeze to conduct a review of agency programs and determine potential future funding allocations for programs that are "consistent with the law and the President's priorities." The missive from the Acting Director of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) indicated that the memo should not be construed to impact Medicare or Social Security benefits. White House officials later said it would not impact Medicaid either. While the extent of the implications of this evolving situation is still being determined, VHHA is working with elected officials, government agency partners, members, and stakeholders to assess the potential programmatic and financial impacts of any federal action.

VDH Reports Two Pediatric Flu Fatalities in Virginia

This week, the **Virginia Department of Health** (VDH) reported two influenza-associated pediatric deaths. These are the first such reports for the 2024–25 influenza (flu) season in Virginia. One death occurred in a young school-aged child (5–12 years old) in Virginia's Eastern Region. Another involved a teenager (13–17 years old) in the Central Region. As hospitals and health care providers experience an increase in flu cases and patients seeking care, VDH continues to encourage preventative behaviors such as annual flu vaccination, hand hygiene, and staying home when ill. CDC Urges Clinician, Laboratories to Expedite Subtyping Hospital Patient Influenza A Specimens

The **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention** (CDC) <u>recently issued</u> a Health Alert Network (HAN) Health Advisory to clinicians and laboratories due to sporadic human infections with avian influenza A(H5N1) viruses amid high levels of seasonal influenza activity. The CDC is recommending a shortened timeline for subtyping all influenza A specimens among hospitalized patients and increasing efforts at clinical laboratories to identify non-seasonal influenza. Clinicians and laboratorians are reminded to test for influenza in patients with suspected influenza and, going forward, to now expedite the subtyping of influenza A-positive specimens from hospitalized patients, particularly those in an intensive care unit (ICU). This approach can help prevent delays in identifying human infections with avian influenza A(H5N1) viruses, supporting optimal patient care and timely infection control and case investigation.

The **Virginia Department of Health's** (VDH) Injury Prevention Program is seeking hospital participation in the Newborn Hospital Discharge Survey. The exploratory survey is intended to gain insight into hospital alignment with American Academy of Pediatrics transportation best practices for newborn discharge. De-identified, aggregated results will be shared publicly and guide future VDH initiatives supporting hospital capacity to promote safe transportation of newborns.
