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VHHA in Action

Each day, VHHA actively works on behalf of its members, their employees, and Virginians to advance the interests of Virginia's hospitals and health care systems. In the past week, here are some developments of interest to Virginia hospitals and health systems:

Virginia General Assembly Nears Conclusion of the 2025 Legislative Session

• The schedule adjournment sine die of the Virginia General Assembly's 2025 regular legislative session is near. The session is set to conclude Saturday, Feb. 22, assuming lawmakers reach a compromise on legislation to amend Virginia's two-year state budget by that deadline. During this year's 46-day session, the VHHA Government Affairs Team has successfully worked on a variety of bills on behalf of hospitals and health systems including legislation on certificate of

public need (COPN), medical debt collection, behavioral health, pharmacy issues, insurance prior authorization reform, maternal health, medical malpractice policy, workforce development, health care professional licensure, long-term care, and more. VHHA has also actively engaged with budget negotiators and staff in support of funding for items of importance to hospitals and health systems. Following adjournment, **Virginia Governor Glenn Youngkin** has 30 days to review bills, including the budget, sent to his desk and take action on them. His options include letting them become law with or without his signature, offering amendments, or issuing vetoes. The General Assembly returns to Richmond on April 2 for the reconvened session to consider amendments and vetoes from the Governor. If the federal government reforms Medicaid policy, it is possible the Governor could call a legislative special session later this year to address potential funding and coverage impacts in the Commonwealth. New Resource Added to VHHA 'Earn While You Learn' Workforce Development Toolkit

A new online resource has been added to the VHHA Earn While You Learn Toolkit reflecting a newly developed plan and sample budget for providers interested in developing this clinical education program model in partnership with high school certified nursing assistant (CNA) programs. The "Earn While You Learn Clinical Education Model" (EWL CEM) is a transformative nurse clinical education model through which academic-clinical partnerships help enhance students' confidence, clinical judgment, and skills acquisition to help prepare more practiceready nurse graduates for employment. EWL CEM accelerates the development of practiceready nurse graduates, creating a hiring pipeline for hospitals that can help reduce orientation costs. Nursing students who participate in the EWL CEM model work part-time at a clinical facility (12-20 hours weekly when school is in session), receive immersive 12-hour clinical rotations, working one on one with an experienced nurse mentor (preceptor) while receiving a stipend and engaging in regular mentoring meetings to consolidate learning. Additional grant dollars for Earn While You Learn are expected to be announced this spring. News Updates

White House Issues 'Make America Healthy Again' Executive Order

U.S. President Donald Trump recently issued an <u>executive order</u> creating the Make America Healthy Again Commission that will be led by **Robert F. Kennedy Jr.**, who was recently confirmed as **U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary**. The order directs federal agencies to "aggressively combat the critical health challenges facing our citizens, including the rising rates of mental health disorders, obesity, diabetes, and other chronic diseases."

CDC Estimates 24 Million Flu Cases, More Than 300,000 Hospitalizations So Far This Season

The **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention** (CDC) estimates that at least 24 million people have had seasonal flu this season, leading to 310,000 hospitalizations, and 13,000 deaths from flu so far; the agency notes that "seasonal influenza activity remains elevated and continues to increase across the country." CAQH Index Report Offers Insights on Savings Opportunities for Health Care Organizations

The Council for Affordable Quality Healthcare (CAQH) recently issued a <u>report</u> highlighting how the health care industry can save \$20 billion by transitioning from manual to electronic workflows. The report also notes that the industry could save \$515 million annually on electronic prior authorizations and save providers and staff 14 minutes per transaction.

NIH Issues Supplemental Guidance on Reducing Grant 'Indirect Cost Rates'

The **National Institutes of Health** (NIH) recently issued <u>supplemental guidance</u> indicating that the agency will apply a 15 percent indirect cost rate across all new and existing grant awards, in contrast to previous grant policy. The new policy will be applied to all current grants for future expenses as of Feb. 10 as well as for all new grants issued; it replaces any negotiated rates for existing grant awards. NIH also indicated it would not apply the policy retroactively, though it asserts it has that authority under federal law. Indirect cost rates apply to overhead expenses for facilities and administration and may include expenses such as operations and maintenance, building depreciation, capital improvement costs and outlays for administrative staff. NIH indicates that the average indirect cost rate has been in the 27-28 percent range, with some organizations charging 50-60 percent. This could potentially impact academic medical centers and organizations that conduct clinical research. A federal court in Massachusetts recently issued a <u>temporary order</u> blocking the new guidance.

CDC Issues Alert on Ebola Outbreak in Uganda, U.S. Clinician Recommendations

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently issued a Health Alert Network (HAN) Health Advisory about a confirmed outbreak of Ebola disease in Uganda caused by the Sudan virus (species *Orthoebolavirus sudanense*). In response the CDC is offering recommendations to U.S. public health departments and clinicians about case identification, testing, and biosafety considerations in clinical laboratories. Currently, no suspected, probable, or confirmed Ebola cases related to this outbreak have been reported in the United States, or outside of Uganda. However, as a precaution and because there are other viral hemorrhagic fever (VHF) outbreaks in East Africa, CDC is sharing best practices for public health departments, public health and clinical laboratories, and health care workers in the United States to raise awareness about this outbreak.
