Each day, VHHA actively works on behalf of its members, their employees, and Virginians to advance the interests of Virginia's hospitals and health care systems. In the past week, here are some developments of interest to Virginia hospitals and health systems:

Virginia General Assembly Reveals Budget Proposals, Moves Past Session Halfway Point

The Virginia General Assembly recently reached two pivotal moments in the 2025 regular legislative session: budget Sunday and crossover day. Budget Sunday was Feb. 2, when the legislative money committees unveiled their proposed amendments to the current two-year state budget. In terms of issues of interest to VHHA members, both the House and Senate budgets fully fund the Medicaid forecast of roughly \$632 million over the biennium, a significant increase in such funding to address projected program needs. The House budget includes language related to hospitals' participation in the supplemental payment program to help enhance reimbursement rate improvement. On maternal health, the Senate budget includes \$2.1 million for the Virginia Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS) to expand remote patient monitoring to pregnant women on Medicaid. The House budget includes \$4.4 million for Medicaid presumptive eligibility for pregnant individuals, \$2.5 million for a perinatal health hub pilot program, \$2.5 million for a mobile maternal health clinic, and \$550,332 to increase Medicaid reimbursement for midwives. Both budgets include the proposal from Virginia Governor Glenn Youngkin to increase funding for graduate medical education slots for psychiatric and obstetric-gynecological specialties. The House budget also includes funding to add Medicaid support for five additional medical education residency slots for anesthesiologists and allocates \$25 million to launch an Early Childhood Public-Private Partnership Pilot with private employers to create approximately 2,585 slots supported by public and private funding. From here, the next key budget deadline is Feb. 12 when each chamber must complete work on budget and revenue bills and appoint conferees to negotiate final compromise plans. Another important milestone in the process occurred this Tuesday, Feb. 4, which was crossover day. That is effectively the halfway point in the session and represents the deadline by which bills must clear their chamber of origin, House of Delegates or Virginia Senate, in order to remain active for consideration by the legislature. After the legislature adjourns (adjournment is scheduled for Feb. 22), the Governor reviews bills, including the budget, sent to his desk and has the option to let them become law, offer amendments, or issue vetoes. The General Assembly returns to Richmond on April 2 for the reconvened session to consider amendments and vetoes from the Governor. Throughout this time, the VHHA Government Affairs Team will be at the State Capitol in Richmond advocating for policies that support hospitals, health systems, and public health. VHHA Hosts Latest Webinar in EMS Drug Kit Transition Series

• This week, the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) Office of Emergency Medical Services (OEMS) in collaboration with the Virginia Hospital & Healthcare Association (VHHA) and the Virginia Society of Health-System Pharmacists (VSHP), hosted the latest installment of a webinar series focused on the upcoming drug kit transition affecting Virginia's EMS agencies in 2025. Panelists and topics for the webinar session included the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) on use of the CSOS and Form 222, the Virginia Board of Pharmacy on EMS Audits, and the Virginia Office of Emergency Medical Services on the decision by agencies on whether to carry medications.

Report Shows Virginia Hospital Spending Below National Average, Health Insurance Costs Rise Sharply

 Virginia families and individuals have endured double-digit percentage increases in health insurance premium costs in recent years, according to a <u>new statewide analysis of health care</u> spending trends conducted by **Onpoint Health Data**, a non-partisan analytics firm. The analysis shows that from 2019-2023, annual private health insurance premiums in Virginia increased 20.2 percent for single individuals and 22.1 percent for families. During the same period, total personal health care (PHC) spending (which includes hospital and professional care) increased by just 1.2 percent. The study further notes that since 2008 single premiums are up 94 percent and family premiums have risen 103 percent. When annual out-of-pocket deductible costs are added to premium costs, total insurance costs have gone up 103 percent and 110 percent, respectively. The Onpoint Health Data analysis shows that the average single health insurance premium in 2023 was \$8,144 and the average family health insurance premium was \$24,251 for people with private sector employer-sponsored health care coverage. Findings in the study are based on data from the **U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis** (BEA), the **U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services** (CMS), and the **Virginia All-Payer Claims Database** (APCD). The report evaluates total health care spending, spending by category and payer, insurance premiums, and workforce trends. Read more here.

Virginia Health Commissioner Shares Bird Flu Update in Clinician Letter

Virginia State Health Commissioner Dr. Karen Shelton, MD, in a recent letter to clinicians shared an update on avian influenza A(H5) (bird flu) activity in Virginia birds. Avian influenza A(H5) has not been detected in people or dairy cattle in Virginia, though it has recently been detected in Virginia in wild birds, commercial poultry, and in birds housed in a zoo collection. At this time, the risk from avian influenza viruses to the public remains low. People with job-related or recreational exposure to birds or other avian influenza virus-infected animals are at greater risk of infection. Clinicians should consider the possibility of avian influenza virus infection in persons showing signs or symptoms of acute respiratory illness or conjunctivitis who have a relevant exposure history. This includes people who have had contact with potentially infected sick or dead birds, livestock, or other animals or animal products within 10 days before their symptom onset. Baxter International Announces all IV Fluid Manufacturing Lines Have Been Reactivated

Baxter International Inc. recently shared that the company has restarted all 10 manufacturing lines at its North Cove plant in Marion, NC, noting that while some lines require additional time to ramp up production, the expectation is that production across the plant at pre-hurricane levels will be achieved early in the first quarter of 2025. Last September, flooding and rain damage from Hurricane Helene interrupted operations at the North Carolina plant that is a major U.S. manufacturer of IV solutions and fluids – the facility reportedly produced 1.5 million units of IV solution daily pre-storm, accounting for approximately 60 percent of the domestic United States production. The storm damage stalled fluid manufacturing and led to reduced product allocation to health care facilities. Read more here.

FDA Approves Novel Non-Opioid Pain Treatment Medication

The **U.S. Food and Drug Administration** (FDA) recently approved Journavx (suzetrigine) 50 milligram oral tablets, a first-in-class non-opioid analgesic, to treat moderate to severe acute pain in adults. Journavx reduces pain by targeting a pain-signaling pathway involving sodium channels in the peripheral nervous system, before pain signals reach the brain. It is the first drug to be approved in this new class of pain management medicines. Pain is a common medical problem and relief of pain is an important therapeutic goal. Acute pain is short-term pain that is typically in response to some form of tissue injury, such as trauma or surgery. Acute pain is often treated with analgesics that may or may not contain opioids. The FDA has long supported development of non-opioid pain treatment. Read more here.

CISA, FDA Advise on Vulnerability Found in Patient Vital Signal Monitoring Device

The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently issued alerts advising the health care community that cybersecurity vulnerabilities have been found in patient monitoring devices – including the Contec CMS8000 and the Epsimed MN-120 (Contec CMS8000 patient monitors relabeled as MN-120) – that may put patients at risk after being connected to the internet. These cybersecurity vulnerabilities identified could allow unauthorized actors to bypass cybersecurity controls, gaining access to and potentially manipulating the devices.
